Please plan to join us to hear poet and playwright Claudia Rankine deliver the Lillian and Donald Bauder Lecture at 8 p.m. on Friday, April 8, 2016, in Alumnae Hall on the Marygrove College campus. After the lecture, Ms. Rankine will sign copies of her works, which will be available for purchase.

Rankine will be the twenty-eighth guest in Marygrove's Contemporary American Authors Lecture Series. She is the author of five collections of poetry: *Citizen: An American Lyric* (2014), a finalist for the National Book Award and winner of the National Book Critics Circle Award in Poetry; *Don't Let Me Be Lonely: An American Lyric* (2004); *Plot* (2001); *The End of the Alphabet* (1998); and *Nothing in Nature Is Private* (1995), winner of the Cleveland State Poetry Prize. She is also author of two plays: *Provenance of Beauty: A South Bronx Travelogue* (2009) and *Existing Conditions* (2010), along with several edited collections. She has garnered significant critical acclaim throughout her career, including awards and fellowships from the Academy of American Poets, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Lannan Foundation. In 2013, she was elected as a chancellor of the Academy of American Poets; in 2014 she won the Jackson Poetry Prize.

Her work can be considered experimental, as it often defies and unsettles notions of genre. The new directions chartered in her most recent work *Citizen* are as timely as they are poignant. *The Washington Post* contends, "Part protest lyric, part art book, *Citizen* is a dazzling expression of the painful double consciousness of black life in America," and *The New York Times* declares, "*Citizen* is audacious in form. But what is perhaps especially striking [...] is that it has achieved something that eludes much modern poetry: urgency."

Marygrove College alumna Elizabeth A. Burns joined the college as interim provost in August. Most recently, she served as Associate Dean for Faculty and Clinical Affairs and DIO at the Western Michigan University Homer Stryker M.D. School of Medicine. Immediately prior to that, she served four years as President and CEO of the Michigan State University Kalamazoo Center for Medical Studies.

After earning her B.S. from Marygrove, Elizabeth earned an M. D. from the University of Michigan and an M. A. from the University of Iowa College of Education, Division of Instructional Design and Technology, Health Sciences Education.

Following a two year RWJ Foundation fellowship in Academic Family Medicine, Elizabeth began what would become an 11-year faculty and administrative career at the University of Iowa College of Medicine. She has also served University of Illinois at Chicago as Department Head in Family Medicine and University of North Dakota School of Medicine & Health Sciences in Grand Forks. In 2008, she moved to her position at the MSU Kalamazoo Center for Medical Studies.

When asked how it feels to rejoin the Marygrove College community, Elizabeth told us, "I am truly honored to have this opportunity to give back to this college, which played such an important role in my life. I look forward to working with the administration, faculty and staff here to continue the steady progress that we see taking place at Marygrove."

2015 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI



MARY HARRIS MARTIN '62

After Mary graduated in 1962 with a BA in Speech Correction and Education, she married, had three children, and relocated to Montreal. There, she continued her work as a speech and language specialist with the Protestant schools, a career that would span more than 40 years.

In addition to working, volunteering, and raising a family of five, Mary was an active member of the St. Patrick of the Island Parish in Quebec. However, after just a few short years in Canada, Mary's life hit an unexpected and devastating turn: Her husband left the family and moved out of the country, leaving Mary and her five young children with little or no financial help.

As a single mother, Mary did whatever it took to keep her young family housed and fed, often working several jobs while still volunteering and serving others. Over the 45 years she has been a member of her parish, Mary has served in countless positions while still serving her local community. In addition to helping establish a local library, she is also a member of the city cultural resource team, is a volunteer reader to pre-school children, and serves on the literacy committee.

Mary admits she prefers to be in the background planting a seed, letting someone else take credit for the end result. "There are quite a few things happening in the parish that I planted the seed for, and everyone has forgotten that I did so. I like it that way," says Mary.



JUDITH ANNE ELIASSEN '64

Judith, or "Sister Judy" as her students and colleagues refer to her, may have graduated from Marygrove in 1964, but her presence has long been felt by those she has served at the college for nearly a decade and a half.

She became Marygrove's Director of Student Academic Enrichment in 2002 and following her success in this role, she became Director of the Teacher Education Support Lab in 2007. For the last eight years, she has helped aspiring teachers prepare for the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification Exam (MTTC).

After receiving her Bachelor of Science from Marygrove College in 1964, Sister Judy began teaching at St. Mary's Academy in Monroe. For 10 years, she taught biology, chemistry, biochemistry, and theology; she was also the assistant resident directress, the auditorium manager, and ran many science fairs. After earning her Master of Science at Purdue University in 1971, she began what would ultimately become a 24-year career at Holy Redeemer High School in Southwest Detroit.

Never content to rest, Sister Judy continued her education at Wayne State University's Howard Hughes Medical Institute before returning to Marygrove College, then to Notre Dame University where she studied Educational Administration. She has served as a Big Sister volunteer at St. Francis Home for Boys, volunteered in playrooms in children's hospitals, published her work in academic journals, newspapers and newsletters, has been a member of 15 professional associations, and has received numerous awards for her achievements.



CAROL WAGNER COUSINEAU '67

Ask her husband; her former Marygrove classmates; her fellow parish librarians at St. Hugo of the Hills; the young women she counsels at the Crossroads Christian Pregnancy Center; the inmates she prayed with in the Oakland County Boot Camp Jail Ministry program; they will all graciously and unanimously describe Carol a woman who has the talent, touch, and humility to "enrich the physical and spiritual lives of everyone she encounters."

Following her graduation from Marygrove College in 1967, Carol spent nearly three decades as an interior designer, became a Professional Member of ASID, raised two children with her husband Ron, and became the founder and administrator of the St. Hugo of the Hills Parish Library. Both she and her husband have been Eucharistic ministers since 1991, and since 2007, Carol has volunteered one day a week at Crossroads Pregnancy Center in Auburn Hills. Here, she provides spiritual direction, child-raising education, and material support for mothers.

In 2009, Carol and her husband who are Rotarians partnered with an Ecuadorian Rotary Club to bring 225 filters—each on capable of providing 20 gallons of safe drinking water daily—to families, schools and convents. Over the years, Carol has accepted many callings. For almost 14 years, until funds for the program ceased, she was Music Minister every other Sunday for the Oakland County Bootcamp Prison Ministry for the Archdiocese of Detroit allowing her to share her faith and her music.

When talking about Helen, her friends and colleagues readily offer such words as dedicated, committed, warm, energetic, determined, logical, peacemaker. These are, indeed, accurate descriptors—but they only provide a partial image, a sketch of who Helen is.

In addition to a successful, 30-year career in the non-profit sector, Helen and her husband Darryl are active foster parents, have taken in several “troubled teens,” and raised a family of nine, including three adopted children and a son with special needs.

While raising a family, Helen has served as Executive Director of the Food Bank of Oakland County, Executive Director of the Michigan AIDS Coalition, Program Officer for the Children’s Hospital of Michigan Foundation, and President and CEO of Macomb Habitat for Humanity.

After completing her Bachelor of Arts in English from Marygrove in 1984, Helen began work on her Master of Arts in Educational Administration, and then became Executive Director for the Food Bank of Oakland County. In 2009, Helen took her leadership skills to the Michigan AIDS Coalition (MAC). Following her success with MAC, she became President and CEO of Macomb Habitat for Humanity.

Helen has been featured in, and contributed articles to, magazines and newspapers. She has also received many awards including: Comerica’s Leadership Award and the Leadership Award for Best Non-Profit; Crain’s Detroit Business Awards for Best-Managed Non-Profit and Executive Woman of the Year; the Detroit News Award for Michiganian of the Year; and National Hunger’s Hope Award in Development by American’s Second Harvest, to name a few.



SHEILA DORSEY-SMITH '86

Sheila Dorsey-Smith has touched many lives in her nearly 30-year career since graduating from Marygrove College. As those she’s touched characterize their interactions with her, a picture emerges of Sheila as compassionate, dedicated and capable.

After spending several years in the business world, Sheila became program administrator for The City of Detroit in 1990. There, she developed academic success programs to help disadvantaged students while also working as a substitute teacher in the Detroit Public Schools.

In 1995, she earned her certification from Eastern Michigan University in Secondary Teaching and Vocational Marketing. From there, she continued on to earn a Master’s Degree in Educational Leadership from Saginaw Valley in 1999, and most recently began to pursue her Doctorate in Educational Leadership at Western Michigan.

Proving to be an accomplished teacher, administrator and program developer, she created an inner city summer program to enrich youth 5-18; worked as a placement coordinator for a summer co-op program; became a K-8 Assistant Principal and then Principal; became Executive Director of Human Resources for Saginaw Public Schools; and today, is Assistant Superintendent of HR for the Kalamazoo Public Schools, a 13,000 student school district.

Not only a mentor to countless students, Sheila mentors work associates as well. Simply put, says daughter Laina Dorsey, her mother “believes that if she can do or say something to help better someone, then it is her duty.”

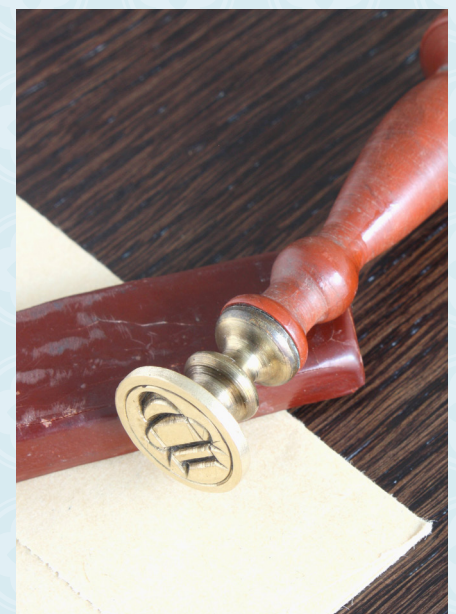

GRANT JOINS PULITZER PRIZE-WINNING JOURNALIST STEPHEN HENDERSON AND MARYGROVE COLLEGE

In November, Marygrove College announced the launch of The Tuxedo Project, which coincides with a \$150,000 grant recently awarded to the college by the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation. The grant, which will be awarded over two years, will enable the college to transform 7124 Tuxedo, the now-abandoned and blighted childhood home of Detroit Free Press Editorial Page Editor Stephen Henderson, into a writer's residence and literary center.

In tandem with the restoration project at 7124 Tuxedo, the college's English and Modern Languages department will begin a national search for the project's first fellow who, in addition to teaching at Marygrove College, will also live in the restored house, run the literary center there, and provide outreach and resources to the community. "The Tuxedo Project provides a tangible way to link our discipline, our students, and the larger community in collaborative

revitalization," said Darcy L. Brandel, Associate Professor of English and Chair of English and Modern Languages at Marygrove College. "We are honored to share what we know about reading, writing, and storytelling in ways the neighborhood residents find most useful. We are very excited to move forward."

Marygrove College was chosen from over 1,000 applicants and 70 finalists, and receives this grant as a part of the Knight Arts Challenge, a \$9 million initiative to draw the best and most innovative ideas out of local organizations and individuals seeking to engage and enrich the community through the arts.

"The grant awarded to us by the Knight Foundation allows Marygrove to truly set an example for what needs to happen if we are serious about revitalizing the entire city of Detroit," said Marygrove Interim President James F. Birge, Ph.D. "The area near Grand

River and Livernois is not one of the neighborhoods currently attracting investment or experiencing growth. The residents in this area, like the 5,000 residents in the area just outside our campus gates—some of whom are students at our institution—are looking for local leaders and anchor institutions like ours to do their part in revitalizing the community."

Renovation efforts of the Tuxedo Project not only include transforming the former home of Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Stephen Henderson into a writer's residence and literary center for children and adults in the neighborhood but also demolishing and reclaiming blighted property adjacent to 7124 Tuxedo.

DONOR SPOTLIGHT

SISTER RITA KILLEEN, IHM URBAN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP SCHOLARSHIP

The SISTER RITA KILLEEN, IHM URBAN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP SCHOLARSHIP is awarded annually to junior or senior Teacher Education students who demonstrate strong academic performance and whose commitment to the education of children is made visible through education service in an urban school. Recipients of this scholarship must:

- Demonstrate exceptional academic performance (2.7 GPA at the time of application and maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher while receiving the scholarship)
- Contribute at least 15 hours of educational service in an urban school & provide a written or visual reflection/documentation that addresses how the educational enrichment project met the challenges of educating in an urban setting
- Interview with the Education Department Faculty

The Sister Rita Killeen, IHM Urban Educational Leadership Scholarship was established in 2007 as an endowed scholarship by Charles and Veronica Killeen Pelzer '54, in memory of her sister, Rita Killeen IHM '59.

Raised in a family of seven children, the Killeens experienced the death of their father, the "breadwinner" before they were out of their teens. The children, then, shared the responsibility of supporting the family financially. No one worked harder than Rita – who shared her infectious gift of laughter through it all.

Rita chose religious life as a way to serve God and others. As a member of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart (IHM) congregation, she had the opportunity to help children learn. With both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Education, she appreciated what dedicated teachers could accomplish. Sister Rita truly enjoyed the progress her students made each year and was particularly gifted in her work with first graders.

Understandably then, the spirit of the award comes from the person of Rita Killeen: *The Scholarship is awarded to a Marygrove undergraduate Teacher Education student during her/his junior or senior year who demonstrates strong academic performance and whose commitment to the education of children is made visible through education service in an urban school.*

Though cancer cut short Sister Rita's life, the generosity of the Pelzer family in sponsoring allows students at Marygrove to share her vision and commitment to urban youth.
